





# Create Your Own Shabbat Box

## Step 1: Find an empty box

This can be a shoebox, a plastic bin, an empty packaging box—whatever you have. If you don't have a box, feel free to use a bag.



## Step 2: Decorate the box

You can paint, color with markers, add stickers, gems and feathers or anything else that makes your Shabbat box special and unique.



## Step 3: Add items to your box

- Two Shabbat candles
- Two candlestick holders

*If you have self-dry clay, you can mold and decorate your own! You can also make them out of tinfoil.*



- Small tablecloth or napkin to set a beautiful Shabbat table
- Kiddush cup

*You can make your own by coloring the outside of a plastic cup.*



- Plate for your challah
- Two loaves of challah (challot)

*You can make your own special plate by coloring a paper plate.*

*Practice braiding your own non-edible challot with Play-Doh or make them out of paper.*

- Challah cover

*Decorate your own using fabric markers on a piece of fabric, or color a paper napkin.*



- Flower

*This can be made out of tissue paper, construction paper and pipe cleaners.*



- Tzedakah box

*This can be a piggy bank, or a decorated cup or container.*




## Step 4: Set your Shabbat table


# Shabbat Love

# Make Your Own Cut-Out Collage for Shabbat: Henri Matisse-Style

Henri Matisse was a French artist who painted subjects that made him happy and were meaningful to him. He used bright colors, bold shapes and decorative patterns in his many paintings of nature, people, still life and interiors (rooms in a home or studio). When he got older, he became sick and had an operation. Matisse was too weak to paint at his easel while he was recovering, so he invented a new way to make art. He began to cut out shapes with scissors. He had the idea of painting pieces of paper different colors and, when dry, he cut more big shapes, calling it “drawing with scissors.” Matisse became excited to put these shapes together to make many collage pictures that he called the “cut-outs.”



## Step 1: Gather your materials

- Black paper
- Colored paper
- Patterned paper
- White paper (you can also use the white paper to make your own colorful paper with markers or crayons)
- Pencil
- Eraser
- Markers
- Crayons
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- Elmer's Glue





### Step 2: Make a plan

Think up some ideas for your collage. What do you want in your interior: window, table, rug, chair and plants? What Shabbat items will you add: candles, challah, spice box and kiddush cup?



### Step 3: Cut out your shapes

Try drawing with scissors like Henri Matisse. This means that you cut shapes without drawing them first with a pencil. If you need to draw some of the shapes first, it's OK! Just remember to erase the pencil lines later.




### Step 4: Arrange your shapes

Begin to arrange your shapes on the black paper to reveal your Shabbat picture.



### Step 5: Glue the papers down one at a time

Start at the bottom and work your way up. Add any details and new ideas until it makes you happy.




### Step 6: Choose a colorful paper to act as a frame
